- Bilingual Health week is one of the largest mobilization efforts of federal and state government agencies, community-based organizations, and volunteers in the Americas to improve the health and well-being of the underserved Latino population living in the United States and Canada.

The event and its weeklong national observance encompass topics on health promotion and health education activities that include workshops, insurance referrals, vaccinations and medical screenings.
